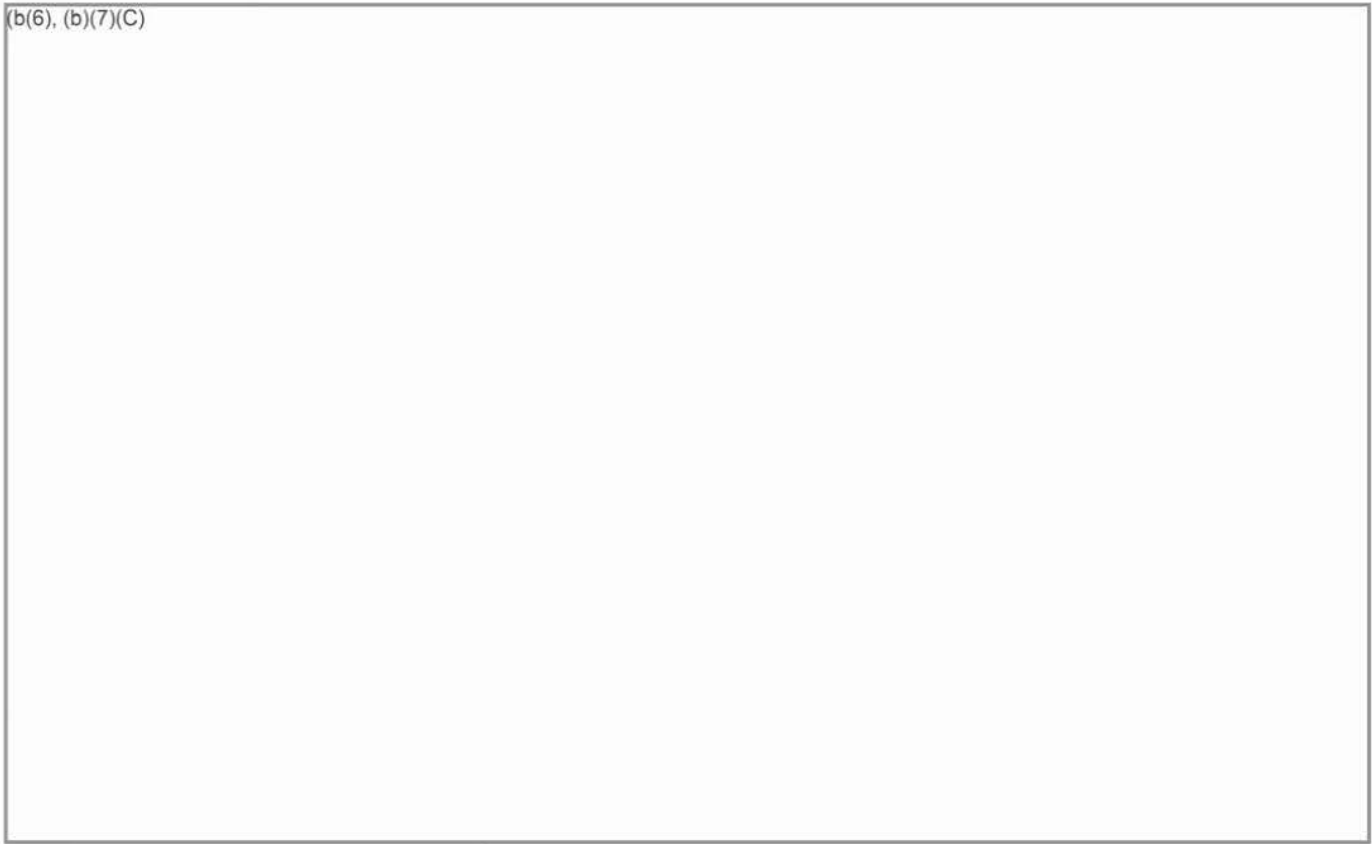

INVESTIGATIVE ACTION: SEARCH OF RESIDENCE STUDY

At approximately 1440, on 16May96, reporting agent arrived on scene at ADM BOORDA's residence, located on the Washington Navy Yard, Washington, DC. Reporting agent was briefed by ASAC Crim. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) concerning the shooting death of ADM BOORDA. SAC (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) advised the lead agency on this investigation would be the Metropolitan Police Department (MPDC), Washington, DC. SA (b)(6) advised that the outside scene would be coordinated by SA (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and reporting agent would coordinate for NCIS the inside residence scene. SA (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) provided that a suspected suicide note was observed on the desk of the study in the residence.

At approximately 1450, reporting agent, Detective (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) MPDC, MPDC Photographer and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Crime Scene Technician, ASAC (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) entered the residence and proceeded to the study. The study was located up the main stairwell to the first level. Turn right, down the hall to the corner and then left to the first room on the right. The study door was open and when entered a two page note was visible on the desk. The two pages were laid out side by side in the center of the desk. The scene (the study) was photographed by MPDC, and sketches prepared. A visual inspection of the room revealed there were no obvious weapons or classified material present in the room. The two page note was seized by MPDC and reporting agent located a third sheet of white paper in the waste can on the floor to the right of the desk. The sheet of paper was crumpled up and upon inspection was found to have the words "God bless all of you" printed on it. That paper was also seized by MPDC. A briefcase, suspected, then identified as belonging to ADM BOORDA was observed against the far wall from the entrance/exit of the study. The briefcase was not locked and was checked for classified and/or weapons or ammunition. It did not contain either. The room was searched for weapons and ammunition as well as any classified material. None were observed. A layout drawing/blue print of the residence was provided to MPDC. The computer which was possibly used to write the two page letter was seized, including the computer, monitor, printer and essential connecting hardware. Also four non-commercial three and a half inch disks were seized by NCISFO Washington, DC, as well as a STU phone key which was removed from the STU phone located in the study. The computer, monitor, printer, hardware, software, and STU key were entered into the NCISFO Washington DC evidence custody system under evidence log number 150-96. All phones were checked for the last numbers dialed and those numbers were provided to MPDC. At approximately 1700, 16May96, the search of the residence interior was terminated. Reporting agent departed the residence, and joined the exterior search team.

This morning I started at the CNO's residence, on the Washington Navy Yard at approximately 0545. I got there by my person vehicle, a 1994, Eagle Talon, vehicle license plate VA _____ I parked in the driveway in front of the garage, located at Tingey House. I opened the garage and pulled out the Lincoln Town car. I left the residence and drove directly to the Pentagon. I walked upto the Admiral's office and went to pick up the message board. Upon arrival I met _____ USN and was told it was going to be late morning.

USN, then told me I was to take the message board and deliver it to his quarters and then return directly to the Pentagon, without the Admiral. This was different, in that today we did not follow the preplanned schedule and no apparent reasons for not following it. Normally I am notified the night before or early that morning if there is a schedule change. I then drove to the CNO's residence and pulled into the driveway. I sat there about four minutes and the CNO came out of the house, dressed in "whites." I got out of the car and gave him the message board. He said "I did not even know you were out here." I replied "I did not want to wake up the Misses." He finished by saying "I'll see you back here at 0930."

so I went back to the Pentagon and then went to see _____, USMC, who is a Pentagon tour guide. I saw him for a few minutes and then returned to the CNO office, reporting back to _____. I stayed there till 0900 when I left the Pentagon enroute the quarters. I arrived at the residence at approximately 0930, the Admiral was outside in the driveway with the _____ named _____ (LNU). He gave me his briefcase, he entered the car by himself and we drove to the Pentagon. We went together up to his office, with me escorting him in through the business side. I went to my desk in the social side and a few minutes later I talk to _____, his aide de camp, and he told me to do a "drive ahead"

to the White House. I did this and returned to the Pentagon at approx. 1230.

When I returned to the social side, [redacted] said I had to return to the business side. Upon entering I saw [redacted] who told me the CNO had taken the car back to quarters. I think I must have missed the CNO coming down the steps as I was going up. I normally keep the keys in the ignition because the car has touch pad entry. [redacted] said "lets go" and we returned in his personal car, a blue Mazda four door sedan, to the CNO's quarters. While driving over, [redacted] said to me that the CNO told him, that he did not want me to drive him over to his quarters. [redacted] said he told him this while he was walking him down to the Town car, at the Pentagon. [redacted] stated the CNO said this "three times."

We then drove inside the base gate and he dropped me off at the quarters gate. [redacted] then advised me I should wait at the gate until I see the Admiral. I waited at the gate five to ten minutes and then walked over to the guardhouse and got a magazine out of their trash. I talked for a minute and then went back over to the gate. I received a page, while standing there, from [redacted]. He asked me if I was "doing okay" and wondered how it was standing there. I asked him if I could move the car and he said I could. I entered the car and saw his keys were not in the ignition. I used the spare set and turned the car around, pointing it towards the guard gate. I sat at the drivers seat and put the radio on, not loudly. A few minutes later I saw the CNO's pants leg in my rear view mirror. He was walking in the garden area. All I could see was him from the waist down and I couldn't see what he was doing. I called [redacted] on the cell phone and I told him I saw him walking in the garden. [redacted] told me to wait on him. While still on the phone I saw the CNO fall over into the grass. I did not hear a gun shot. I ran straight to the CNO. When I approached him he was laying on his back, his arms were straight out at his sides, his legs were straight and standing width apart, and his eyes were open and looking up. I bent down to his right side and I smelled gun powder. I did not see any blood at this time. I looked at his chest and I saw a small burnt hole in the middle of his chest. Then I looked at his feet and I saw the gun. I then felt for his pulse and I felt a weak pulse at his neck. He was gasping for air. he started to bleed and I then ran to the guard post and told them to call for an ambulance. As I ran back to the CNO I saw [redacted] USN near the guard house. I told him the CNO had been shot and I needed a hand.

We both ran back to the CNO. I took off my tie, opened his shirt, and used it to apply direct pressure to the wound. [redacted] and I started CPR. The CNO responded with a few breaths and we continued with the CPR until relieved by medical personnel.

In regards to the gun, the weapon was a revolver, chrome,

I make this statement of my own free will and without any threats made to me or promises extended. I fully understand that this statement is given concerning my knowledge of this is a statement regarding the death of Admiral Boorda, which occurred on Thursday, May 16, 1996 in the area of 8th and M Sts. S.E., Washington, D.C..

For the purpose of identification, I am a [REDACTED] male, [REDACTED] tall, weighing approximately [REDACTED] pounds. I have [REDACTED] hair and [REDACTED] eyes. My social security number is [REDACTED] and I was born on [REDACTED].

Q. Could you please tell me in your own words what you saw or heard in reference to this incident?

A. I was standing guard at Post #2, which is located at the Latrobe Gate 8th and M Sts. S.E., around 1320 hrs. when I observed Admiral Boorda's duty vehicle coming down 8th St. towards the gate. As the vehicle got closer I was able to see that the Admiral was driving and he was alone in the car. I saluted and waved him through the gate. He drove through turned left and pulled into his driveway. I was then able to see the Admiral get out of his car and go inside his house. About fifteen minutes had passed and then the Admiral's Driver pulled up to the gate, he was in a P.O.V. being driven by someone that I did not recognize. I waved them through and the Admiral's Driver got out of the car and stood by the gate to the Admiral's driveway, and the car that he was in left the base. I then saw the Driver make a phone call, using a cellular phone. After this call, which took about five minutes, he came walking over to me. He asked me who drove the Admiral home and I told him that the Admiral was alone. He then asked me if the Admiral was driving fast and I told him no, he was driving normal. He then walked back over to the driveway and stood by the gate. About five more minutes had passed and I noticed that he reached down and took his pager off of his belt and looked at it as if he had received a page. He then took out his phone and placed another call. A few minutes had passed and I had been watching the gate, when I noticed that the Driver was walking up the Admiral's duty car. He got into the car and pulled out of the driveway and then backed back into it. He sit there in the car with the motor running as if he was waiting on the Admiral to come out. Now about ten minutes goes by and I'm watching for the Admiral's car to come out, when I heard what sounded like a gun shot come from the area of the Admiral's house. I first looked to the area in front of me

which would be the streets, and then over to the Admiral's house. This is when the Driver came running out of the gate yelling for me to call 911 Admiral Boorda has been shot in the chest. I immediately called the Guard House and advised [REDACTED] what the Driver had told me. While I was on the phone, the Driver had already ran back onto the grounds of the Admiral's house but I was unable to see where exactly where he had went. About a minute had passed when [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] drove up to the gate. I pointed them in the direction where I had last seen the Driver running and they also ran that way. Then Units from the Metropolitan Police Department, Washington Navy Units, F.B.I., and N.C.I.S. were all on the scene. More Marines were sent down from the Barracks and they assisted the other units in securing the area. I stayed at my post for about twenty minutes after this had started until [REDACTED] came to me and relieved me and told me to come with him. I was then brought down to this office and told that I would have to give a statement in reference to what I had seen and done.

Q: When you first saw the Admiral how did he appear to you?

A: He appeared normal. When I saluted him he stuck his arm out of the window and waved.

Q: Is it normal for the Admiral to drive himself around?

A: Not in his duty vehicle.

Q: Were you no post when the Admiral left in the morning?

A: No. I came on post at 1130 hrs. and the Admiral had already left.

Q: When you saw the Admiral come back and go into his house could you see if he took anything inside with him?

A: No, I was unable to see.

Q: How far is your post from the Admiral's house?

A: I would guess about 150 to 200 feet.

Q: From your post do you have a good view of the front of the Admiral's house and the grounds?

A: I am able to see the front door, the top of a car if one is parked in the driveway, and the yard back to the first set of trees.

Q: Once the Admiral went into the house did you see anyone else go in or come out?

A: No I did not.

Q: Did you hear any unusual noises coming from the Admiral's house?

A: No I did not.

Q: Do you know if there was anyone else in the house before the Admiral went inside?

A: No I don't know if there was anyone else in there. The only other people that I saw were the Admiral's Aide, and a telephone repairman, this was around 1230 hrs. They were walking around the side of the house that is nearest to me. Then they both came outside, the repairman got into his van and drove off, while the Aide walked off towards the Marine Corps Museum.

Q: After the Admiral's Driver came back, did you ever see him go any farther then where the car was?

A: No not until he came and told me to call 911.

Q: Had you seen this driver before?

A: Yes.

Q: Is he a regular driver for the Admiral?

A: Yes there is him and [REDACTED] they both switch as the Admiral's drivers.

Q: Have you ever seen the Admiral carrying a gun?

A: No.

Q: Does the Admiral's Driver carry a gun that you know of?

A: Not that I know of.

Q: Is there anything else that you would like to add to your statement?

A: I just feel terrible because the Admiral is my main concern on this post.

The D.C. Police Department and the N.C.I.S. is investigating a shooting that occurred on today's date inside of the Navy Yard, sir in your own words please tell me what you know about this shooting.

I was coming up the street, in front of quarters B, and I as I came up the street I was walking North towards the visiting Flag Quarters. I saw (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) running in the CNO's yard going towards the house, from my vision it was right to left. The driver ran across the front of the house and out the gate to the Latrobe Gate-Marine Guard. After talking with the Marine guard he turned to run back towards the house. As the driver turned and ran towards the house he saw me coming up the street and yelled Sir come with me Admiral Boorda has been shot. I sprinted behind the driver through the gate to the East end of the garden. Admiral Boorda was lying in the South East corner on the ground, face up. The driver open the Admiral's shirt and jacket and uncovered the wound in his chest. I knelt down to the Admiral's head and the two of us began CPR on Admiral Boorda. I remember when the driver open the Admiral's shirt and saw the hole in his chest the Driver removed his tie folded the tie and put it over the wound and applied pressure. I asked the driver if he was breathing or had a pulse he responded that he had a thin pulse. I positioned the Admiral's head and then began CPR. As we were doing CPR I was giving the breathes and the Driver was giving the chest compressions, we got about three or four breathes from Admiral Boorda they were single breathes. During the CPR we heard people outside in the street and yelled for them to come back to where we were. I dont know if it was the Chief of the Historical center or the a security person that got back to us first, there were about three people that showed up. This was after about 9 or 10 breathes and chest compression, this is just a guess. Not to much longer the medical people arrived the driver back off and I gave the Admiral two or 3 more breathes when the medical personnel gave oxygen.

QUESTION: Did you hear a gunshot?

ANSWER: No I did not

QUESTION: Did you see a weapon on the scene?

ANSWER: I saw the gun in the grass after I step up from the Admiral and stepped away and the medical people were taking care of the Admiral. The gun was a silver colored gun black handled revolver.

QUESTION: Did you touch the gun?

ANSWER: No I did not

QUESTION: Did the Admiral say anything to you or to the driver?

ANSWER: No he was unconscious

At approximately 1430, 16MAY96, at Engine Company 2, Building 122, Washington Navy Yard, I heard the dispatcher announce over the radio system, "Building 2...person shot". It should be noted that Engine Company 2 is in very close proximity to the Chief of Naval Operations Residence, and the Visiting Flag Quarters.

Using hand signals between the fire crew and security, we were given the signal that the area was clear and to come over to assist. This was about one minute, just long enough to take a quick look of the area, to make it safe for us to come in. Two individuals had started CPR, one in Navy whites give the victim mouth to mouth, possibly his aide, and one in a brownish/pink suit administering chest compressions, possibly his driver. When (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) a firefighter with Company 2, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) came on the scene the aide and driver backed away on the fire company's command. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) took over ventilations with the oxygen bottle, and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) took over compressions. The victim's chest was exposed, I did not see powder burns on the body, but saw them on the outside shirt. The victim had a wound into the sternum. The victim had on a white Navy uniform. The wound appeared to be one from a .38 or a .357 magnum. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) gave me a trauma pad and I put it on top of the wound. A weapon was located at his right foot, which I thought was a Smith and Wesson, black ~~with~~ wooden handles, possibly a 38. The victim was located ten to fifteen from the brick wall, between the wall and the green house in the far right hand corner of the yard.

I, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), make the following free and voluntary statement to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) whom I know to be a Special Agent of the United States Naval Criminal Investigative Service. I make this statement of my own free will and without any threats made to me or promises extended. I fully understand that this statement is given concerning my knowledge of the alleged shooting of at the residence of the Chief of Naval Operations, Washington Navy Yard, Washington, DC.

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) For the purpose of identification, I am a (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) male, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) tall, weighing approximately (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) pounds. I have (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) hair and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) eyes. My social security number is (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and I was born on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). I am employed as a Fire Fighter/Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) for the Naval District Washington (NDW) Fire Department. I am assigned to the Washington Navy Yard (WNY) Firehouse, building 122, located just inside the 8th and M street gate, adjacent to the residence of the Chief of Naval Operations (CNO).

On 16 May 1996, between 1:30 PM to 1:45 PM, I was on the second floor of the firehouse (Bldg 122, WNY) in the "Day Room" repairing a lamp. The window in the room which looks out to the parade grounds and the CNO's residence was open. At that time, I heard a "cap" sound that sounded like a small fire cracker going off. I heard only one cap sound. I did not hear any other noises or screams before or after the cap sound. I was alone in the Day Room at the time and positioned about 6 feet from the open window. I did not think much of the cap sound and continued to work on the lamp.

Approximately two minutes later, I heard a male voice, I think it was (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) my Captain at the firehouse, yell "we have a gun shot". I ran down stairs to the front door of the firehouse. I was met there by Fire Fighter (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). I, we, saw a NDW Security/Police Officer carrying a shot gun and motioning to us to come over to the CNO's residence. I think the Police Officer yelled "we have a gun shot". (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) stopped us briefly, approximately 20 seconds, until the Police Officer reported back to us that the scene was secure for us to respond. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and I got our medical bag and oxygen kit from the fire truck and ran over to the CNO's residence. We responded to the East side of the residence and continued to the outside reception area of the yard where we saw several people either standing next to or (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

administering CPR on a unconscious person laying on the grass. Standing by the unconscious person was a white male US Marine Guard and the same NDW Police Officer mentioned above. A white male dressed in a business suit, a black male US Navy Petty Officer, and a white male USN Lieutenant were administering CPR.

I recognized the unconscious person by his face to be the CNO, Admiral Boorda. Boorda was wearing a service white uniform with navy blue jacket, laying on his back, hands to his side with his feet facing East. Boorda's shirt had been torn open at the chest and I noticed a round wound in the center of his chest the size of a dime. A lot of arterial blood surrounded the wound. The wound was located in the center of his chest on the sternum, approximately 1 to 2 inches above the xiphoid. I immediately went to the victim's head and began to attempt to open the airway. I put the oxygen mask on his face but had trouble getting the airway open. had placed a trauma dressing over the wound and the others continued to give CPR.

I did not notice any type of weapon near the victim or anywhere else but someone had informed me that there was a gun near the victim. In addition to the information reported above, my primary survey of the victim revealed the following: no pulse; no breathing; no body movement; eyes dilated and slightly glazed; and white foam around the mouth. I also notice there appeared to be blood under the victim but I did not check for an exit wound.

We continued to provide oxygen and CPR while the WNY ambulance/EMT crew arrived on the scene. I also notice other people arriving on the scene, i.e. other NDW police and uniformed military members. I asked the white female doctor, USN Commander, who came with the NDW ambulance, to attempt to open the victims airway. The EMT crew started an IV on the victim and was in the process of getting the equipment to open the airway when the District of Columbia Medics arrived on the scene. The DC medics took charge of the scene and immediately open the victim's airway by inserting an EOS tube into the victims mouth and down his throat. The DC medics made the call to transport the victim to the Hospital. Poole and I continued to give CPR while the victim was loaded into the DC ambulance. I believe it was approximately 12 to 15 minutes from the time I arrived on the scene until the

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ambulance departed with the victim.

When I first responded and arrived on the scene, I did not notice anyone else near the CNO's residence except for the individuals I have reported above.

I have been employed as a Firefighter with the Naval District Washington (NDW) Fire Department for about fifteen years. On 16 May 1996, I reported for duty at 0700. I was assigned to work until 0700, 17 May 1996.

I can not remember the exact time, but it is recorded in the dispatch log, when we received the call. I was standing in the fire station talking with the Captain and Assistant Fire Chief when a call came in to respond to Quarters A "for one shot." This is the CNO's residence.

We immediately started towards the apparatus to obtain the necessary equipment. As we were walking to get the equipment, another firefighter walked into the area from the kitchen. I told him to get the aid bag and oxygen because he was closer to it than me.

We then started to the CNO's residence which was across the street from the fire station. When we were 10 to 15 feet outside the fire house, the Assistant Fire Chief stopped us. He said that he wanted to make sure the scene was secure before we walked into it.

There was a NDW police officer wearing a white shirt in front of the CNO's residence. The Assistant chief asked the police officer if the scene was secure, and the police officer said yes. This police officer was also calling and directing us to the east end of the garden.

When I walked into the garden area, I saw two men doing CPR on a third man in the east area of the garden. The man doing the ventilation was in a white Navy uniform. The man doing the compression was in civilian clothing, and the man receiving treatment was in a white Navy uniform.

Two other firefighters got to the victim before I did and took over the CPR activities. I worked as a back up for the firefighters by handing them what equipment they might need and being ready to relieve if necessary.

It was while we were working on the victim, I recognized him as the CNO. I do not know who the other two men were. I heard, but I can not remember who said, that the man in the Navy uniform was (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and the man in civilian clothes was the CNO's driver.

While we were working on the victim, the police officer said to watch out for a weapon. He directed our attention to the area of the victim's feet which were towards the east wall of the garden. When I looked, I saw a hand gun lying on the grass. I noted that the hand gun was dark in color and appeared to be a revolver. I would describe it as a snub nosed. I am not familiar with weapons, and my main focus was the health and well being of the victim. I did not see anyone pick up or move the weapon.

I would estimate it was four to five minutes, if that much, until the medical personnel arrived from building 183, WNY. We remained in the area working with the victim until he was removed by the medical personnel in the ambulance.

After the victim was removed, myself and the other two firefighters walked back to the fire station. We were there for about four to five minutes when we were called to return to the scene. We walked back to the scene and waited.

While we were waiting, we saw (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) aid with blood on his uniform. We helped him clean up, and then we were then transported to the NCIS office for interviews.

I (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) make the following free and voluntary statement to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) whom I know to be a Special Agent of the United States Naval Criminal Investigative Service. I make this statement of my own free will and without any threats made to me or promises extended. I fully understand that this statement is given concerning my knowledge of a medical emergency that I and members of my department responded to on 16 May 96. Concerning this event, I can state the following.

For identification purposes, I am a male, tall, and weigh about lbs., and have hair and eyes. I was born on My social security number is . I am employed as a GS-8 for the Naval District Fire Department, Washington Navy Yard, Washington, DC.

On Thursday, 16 May 96, I was with other members of my department, when about a little past 2:00 P.M., a call came into the station from the dispatch at Bolling Air Force Base reporting a medical emergency for a shooting incident at Quarters "A". I and three other Fire Fighters proceeded to immediately grab the First Aid Bag and Oxygen (O2) bottles, and responded to this call. The other members of my department that responded with me are Fire Fighters

 Quarters "A" is a short distance away from the NDW Fire Department, and we proceeded to walk to the Quarters and through the main entrance gate. Just past the gate, we went to the side yard area just to the right of the quarters. I recall that I saw two people standing over a body lying on the ground to the right of the yard area. Approaching the scene, I quickly recognized that it was Admiral Boorda, the Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) lying on the ground. As we approached, I observed a Naval Officer (NFI) giving mouth to mouth resuscitation to Admiral Boorda. I also saw Admiral's Driver performing chest compressions upon the Admiral. I also saw a hand gun on the ground a little to the right of Admiral Boorda's feet where he was lying on the ground. An NDW Security Officer was stationed near the gun to ensure that it was not disturbed. I also observed that the Admiral was in his white uniform, and also had a blue wind-breaker on. The Admiral had what appeared to me to be a large gunshot wound in the center of his chest. I saw a little blood oozing from the wound but I did not observe any large amounts of blood pumping from the Admiral's chest wound.

Once at the scene, we proceeded to place a Trauma Bandage over Admiral Boorda's chest wound, and provide Oxygen to him using the mask attachment. Fire Fighter Poole also applied chest compressions to the Admiral. This went on for about 12-15 minutes until the Navy Medical Ambulance crew (6 personnel) and then the Washington DC Medical Unit paramedics arrived on the scene and took over. However, I did not observe any response from the Admiral to our emergency medical efforts. The DC Medical Paramedics put an air way into the Admiral's mouth and then he was placed on a stretcher and wheeled to the awaiting DC Medical Ambulance. I recall that around this time the Admiral's complexion was beginning to turn blue.

I drove the DC Medical Ambulance to DC General Hospital and it's my recollection that this trip took about 5 minutes. I believe that the DC Paramedics were performing CPR on Admiral Boorda during the trip from the Navy Yard to the hospital. Upon arriving at DC General Hospital, I helped get the stretcher out of the Ambulance and then the Admiral was wheeled into the Emergency Room. My response to this incident ended at this point as I did not go with the Admiral into the Emergency Room.

Q. This office is investigating a death which occurred on May 16, 1996, at 8th and M Street S.E., Washington D.C. Please tell me in your own words what you know and heard about this incident?

A. About 1400 hours, I recieved a call from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and his words were, "call 911, Admiral BORRDA had been shot". He then hung up, that all he said. After he hung up, I could not think of the address, so I call (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to call 911. I then told (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to call (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to see what was going on. She confirmed, and I went and told (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) what had happen, after that he told me to leave. At that time I responded to the control gate which is Post 2.

Q. Where were you when you recieved the call that the Admiral had been shot?

A. I was at 8th and I Street S.E., in the guard house.

Q. What tour of duty were you working today?

A. SGT of the GUARD, 0730 -0730 hours.

Q. What occurred upon your arrival to 8th and M Street S.E. (POST#2)?

A. Once I arrived I jump out and Post #2 pointed to the corner of the garden when I looked over there was a police officer standing over by the fence I moved over towards him and posted one Marine near the fence. I crossed over the iron fence with one Marine and started clearing the yard. I posted one Marine in the corner facing the road. Then I cleared the green house. After I cleared that, I walked up on ADRIMAL BORRDA, by this time there were a few more people around, so I was moving away, by this time the GUNNY was there and he took control of the situation.

Q. When you observed the Adrimal, did you hear him talking or were there anyone around him?

A. There were two people around him one was doing CPR and I really didn't observe the other guy.

I, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) make the following free and voluntary statement to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

MPD whom I know to be a Special Agent of the United States Naval Criminal Investigative Service and a Det with the Washington DC Police Department. I make this statement of my own free will and without any threats made to me or promises extended. I fully understand that this statement is given concerning my knowledge of shooting of Adm. Boorda which occurred on today's date at approx 1402 at his residence. I was in the guard office and a call from Post #2 to the Cpl of the Guard came across the radio stating that he had heard gunfire from Adm. Boorda's residence and to call 911. Cpl and sgt of the Guard immediately came to me with the news and I instructed the Sgt of the Guard to end the reactionary force to the Admiral's home to secure the perimeter of the residence. Sgt of the guard and the reactionary force ran to the Admiral's residence and I tried to get a hold of the Barracks Commander and let him know the situation. I couldn't get a hold of the Col so I had the Cpl of the Guard get in touch with the Col and I ran to the Admiral's residence. When I arrived the Sgt of the Guard was at the residence garden with the reactionary force. Also in the residence garden was the driver, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) NPD, and an unidentified Naval Lt. who appeared to be giving CPR to the Admiral. Also one of the quarters aides attempted to gain entrance to the site and I told him to go back in the house. The Admiral's body was laying face up with his feet facing the southeasterly direction of the garden. There appeared to be blood in his chest area. I did not see a weapon near the body. I did not get any closer than ten feet from the body. The Fire Dept Emergency Response personnel (3) were allowed to administer first aid to the Admiral. At that time the Admiral's driver approached me and stated, he hadn't heard any shots and that it looked self inflicted. By that time numerous law enforcement personnel were entering the area and I spoke with a MPD detective who described what he wanted me to do with my marines and also who should be coming in and out of the area. From there I posted the marines as the MPD dec. had instructed me to. An unidentified NCIS Agent instructed me to round-up all marines involved to be interviewed and to call the NCIS response team. I controlled my marines as directed by the commanders on the scene.

Q: (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), the Homicide Branch of the Metropolitan Police Department is investigating a shooting which occurred east of the Latrobe Gate inside the Washington Navy Yard. Please tell me where you were and what you were doing when this incident occurred.

A: I was in the guard house when the guard house received a call from post two at approximately 1400 stating that he heard a shot fired and needed assistance. More information came in stating the CNO was shot. At this point, we informed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that the CNO was shot. 911 was notified. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself got into duty wheels and proceeded to the Navy Yard. When we got to Post two, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) pointed to where the shooting occurred. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself proceed to the CNO'S gate, where we met (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) the first officer on the scene.

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself jumped the gate and proceeded to clear the back yard. We saw that there was no assailant in the area. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) posted (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) north of the CNO'S body next to a wicker fence. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) posted south of the CNO'S body. I posted myself next to the revolver lying at the CNO'S feet. At this time, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) came on to the scene and was posted to the left of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) approximately thirty yards away. The CNO'S driver and a naval officer were performing CPR on the CNO. Approximately 1405 (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) came on the scene. Emergency personnel started to arrive at approximately 1430. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) started to coordinate with Naval District Washington Police, Metropolitan Police, Naval Intelligence Service, F.B.I. and EMT'S. We had approximately sixteen armed Marines come down to the patrol gate, where they provided added security.

Once the CNO was removed from the scene,

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) reduced our forces. He posted armed Marines at the CNO'S front hatch and vehicle. They were instructed to allow no one to enter the vehicle or quarters without proper authority. The Naval Intelligence Service asked for witnesses. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself were asked to give statements. I was told to wait in Building 200 until investigators arrived.

Q: From the location where you were posted, did you hear any gunshots?

A: No.

As background, I have been assigned to Admiral Boorda as a mess specialist since FEB90.

Between 1300 and 1330, I was working at Admiral Boorda's residence located at Quarters A, Tingey House, Naval District Washington, Washington, DC, when I received a telephone call from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Admiral Boorda's aid and flag lieutenant. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) stated that Admiral Boorda will be arriving at his house in 10 minutes. A few minutes later, Admiral Boorda arrived alone driving his official vehicle. He exited the vehicle dressed in his white uniform and black jacket. He was not carrying anything; the Admiral left his hat in the car. He gave me the keys to the vehicle and told me to place them on the side table by the main entrance. Admiral Boorda then climbed the back stairs to the second floor. Approximately 5 minutes later, the Admiral's additional mess specialist, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) returned from the Navy Federal Credit Union. At about this time, we both heard the upstairs toilet flush. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and I waited in the kitchen, because we expected the Admiral to ask up to make him and sandwich. At approximately 1400, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Protocol Officer, called to discuss the upcoming party beginning on 23MAY96. Admiral Boorda and I picked up the receiver at the same time; I heard the admiral say "hello". Admiral Boorda listened to my discussing the party arrangements with (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) for approximately 1 minute; I know this, because the phone light blinks whenever someone picks up an extension. Admiral Boorda hung up the receiver and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and I discussed the upcoming event for about 7 to 10 minutes. After (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) telephoned, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) left to go to the Bolling Air Force Base Commissary to shop and to pick-up the Admiral's drycleaning. 20 minutes after I spoke to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) I received a call from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) asking for Admiral Boorda; this was between 1425 and 1430. I placed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)'s call on hold, and I attempted to find Admiral Boorda by buzzing the various upstairs rooms. I

STATEMENT

I, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), make the following free and voluntary statement to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) whom I know to be a Special Agent of the United States Naval Criminal Investigative Service. I make this statement of my own free will and without any threats made to me or promises extended. I fully understand that this statement is given concerning my knowledge of the death of ADM Jeremy Michael Boorda, USN.

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) For the purpose of identification, I am a (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) male, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) tall, weighing approximately (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) pounds. I have (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) hair and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) eyes. My social security number is (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and I was born on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

I have additional information which I wish to convey today from my interview on 16May96. I have been working for Admiral Boorda since Feb90 as a (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). I have on occasion cleaned the study; however, it was (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) who was normally responsible to clean the study. Again, I arrived at the CNO's residence at approximately 0550, on 16May96. At or around 0600, Admiral Boorda and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) came downstairs for coffee. I did not see or notice any changes in Admiral Boorda's demeanor at this time or anything unusual. Admiral Boorda informed me he was going to work at a later time than usual.

Admiral Boorda departed for work at approximately 0900, on 16May96. Subsequently, at approximately 1300-1330, I was notified by (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that Admiral Boorda was on his way home. Shortly thereafter, Admiral Boorda arrived and I met him at the front door. Once he entered the front door, he handed me the key to his official vehicle. He then asked me where was (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). I informed him (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) went to visit his (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). At this time, I did not notice any changes in Admiral Boorda's demeanor. Admiral Boorda immediately went upstairs to the second floor. I did not follow Admiral Boorda. My colleagues and I are not allowed to go up to the second floor/level unless requested by a family member.

Later in the afternoon, two uniformed Metropolitan Police Officers knocked on the front door of the CNO's residence and requested to search the premises for possible intruders. I let them in. They split up in different directions and I followed one of them. I also told them (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), was the only other person inside the residence that I knew of. I had previously seen the ambulance and police activity outside the residence. At this time, I still did not know Admiral Boorda had been shot. I told (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) something happened outside and the police were looking for intruders. After the police cleared the residence I went around to check to see if anything was

(b)(7)(C) knocked over, etc. I went into the study and noticed several papers in the room to include some papers in front of Admiral Boorda's computer. Admiral Boorda often brought work home and left various paper work in his study. I do not look at his papers because some of his work is classified secret or even top secret. While I was in the study, by accident, I happened to notice one of the papers in front of the computer was addressed to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) I did not read the paper. I then left the study. I believe I later told Admiral Boorda's son in law, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) about the papers in the study. I was also concerned about the protection of possible classified material. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

(b)(6),
(b)(7)(C) On 17May96, NCIS Special Agents returned computer equipment belonging to Admiral Boorda to the residence. I signed an evidence custody document acknowledging receipt of the computer equipment. I informed the agents to place the computer equipment inside, near the front door. I informed the agents it was at (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)'s request to place the computer equipment there. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was not at home at this time. She told me earlier in the day where she wanted the agents to place the computer equipment. Later on 17May96, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself carried the computer back to the study. We placed the computer equipment on the floor. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

(b)(7)(C) This statement, consisting of this page and one other was typed for me by Special Agent (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) as we discussed its contents. I have read and understand the above statement. I have been given the opportunity to make any changes or corrections I desire to make and have placed my initials over the changes or corrections. This statement is true and correct. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)
